Our dreams of having our own Shelter facility has been realised and we are proud to be able to say we are **Central Victoria's only "No Kill" Shelter.** That is every animal that comes into BAWCS care is safe until either the right home is found or if non rehomable for whatever reason, they will live out their lives in either long term foster care or at the Shelter facility, with all their needs met.

We are currently caring for numerous animals at the Shelter including cats, kittens, dogs, puppies, horses, ponies, sheep, donkeys, cows, pigs, chickens, roosters and ducks.

Most of these wonderful animals are available for adoption, however some are permanent residents including our 4 pigs Annie, Ollie, Wiggy and Bruce, and our elderly standardbreds Ricky and Barney, and newest arrival **Phantom**, an 18 year old Falabella. What is a Falabella you ask? It is a mini horse! And what a little sweetheart he is. Phantom is 18 years old and suffers from arthritis in his leg and his right hip goes out every now and then. All manageable and Phantom is kept pain free with heaps of attention from the many volunteers that come out to help at the shelter.

GREAT cats....

BAWCS has taken into care many lovely cats this year. Some come with health issues, others behavioural but ALL remain safe with us until they become fit and healthy again (then put up for adoption) or other arrangements are made for lifelong care, sometimes in foster care homes, sometimes permanently at the Shelter like our office cat Socks who featured in our last newsletter.

We'd like to introduce you to some of these cats...

Basil – For most people, the thought of having to surrender their beloved pet is heartbreaking. For many people in palliative care, they have to make that decision to leave their best friends behind....and this is how Basil, our placid champagne senior, came into our care. With a bond formed over 15 years, his "Mum" entrusted her precious boy into BAWCS care and we gladly accepted him, bump and all.

On first glance, you could have been mistaken for thinking Basil was huge...before realising that something was not right! He had a large tumour growing on the left side of his body and although he appeared to have adapted to having this growth attached, it was obvious he would be more comfortable without the "bump".



As with all surgery, and particularly at 15 years of age, there were risks involved but the blood work determined he had a good chance and we knew he would have a better quality of life with the tumour removed so the decision was made to go ahead with the operation.

After a nervous wait, we got the call saying the surgery was a success and the 1kg lipoma (non-cancerous fatty lump) had been removed.

Sue and the team at McIvor Rd Veterinary Centre took such great care of him and he was back at the BAWCS shelter in no time!

Sadly, Basil's mum has since passed away but she can rest peacefully in the knowledge that her beloved Basil will still live on happily in BAWCS care, until we can find a permanent lap for him to curl up on.

With the stitches long since been removed and his fur slowly growing back, Basil is a handsome (and somewhat lighter) boy! He's still getting used to his new found agility and hasn't quite realised he can jump up on your lap himself...or does he just have us wrapped around his clever little paw?

Rusty – Rusty was in a bad way when he came to BAWCS. A large wound on his head and a damaged eye was the most obvious signs of trouble however a blood test

revealed he was also FIV positive The only thing going for this boy was he was now in BAWCS care. Straight to the vet, the head Wound was possibly an abscess that was never treated and the eye had a very painful and deep seated ulcer, with the only option to remove it. It was decided to stitch a skin flap over the wound but it was unknown if this would be successful given the size of the area but we decided to give it a go.



Rusty came through his surgery well with lots of stitches and a drainage tube for his troubles.



A return visit to the vet for a check up and stitch removal with the acknowledgement that the skin flap hadn't worked but it was worth a try and the wound was pink, healthy and healing well.

At time of writing our newsletter, Rusty was looking a lot better and he will be put up for adoption in the New Year.




VALE Casper

Casper was 19 years old when she was surrendered to BAWCS last year, by her owner who was unwell and didn't think she could keep caring for Casper properly. In good health, considering her age, and on a renal diet (to keep her kidneys healthy), we put Casper up for adoption but didn't think there would be any interest in her because of her age.

Rather than keep Casper at the Shelter, we put the word out for a foster care home so Casper could live out her days in comfort, surrounded by love and not wanting for anything.

A lovely young couple stepped up and Casper went to live with them with BAWCS covering all costs associated with her care including the special diet she required to be on. A year on, we had a call advising Casper wasn't herself so a vet visit was arranged, with the outcome not being good. It was suspected that Casper may have a tumour on the brain which was causing her quality of life to deteriorate rapidly. The decision was made to end Casper's suffering and on 27 November 2014, Casper was 'given her wings', another angel at the Rainbow Bridge.



Exciting website news




